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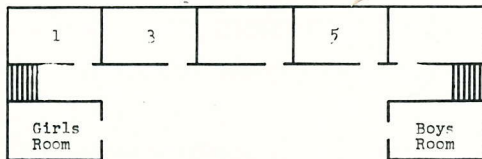
WELCOME TO BOGOTA HIGH SCHOOL

We extend a most hearty welcome to all our new students. We want you to feel that you are now a very important part of Bogota High School.

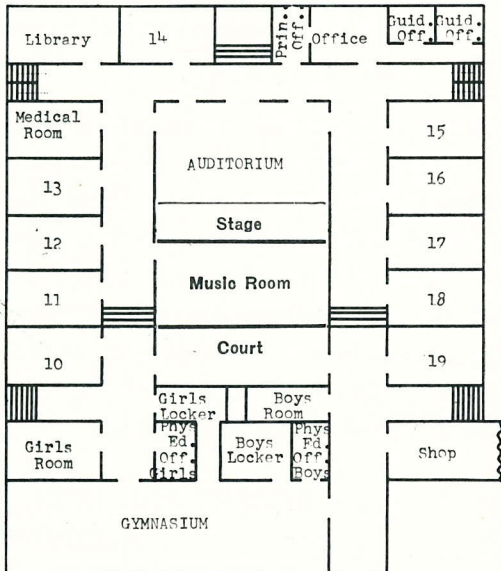

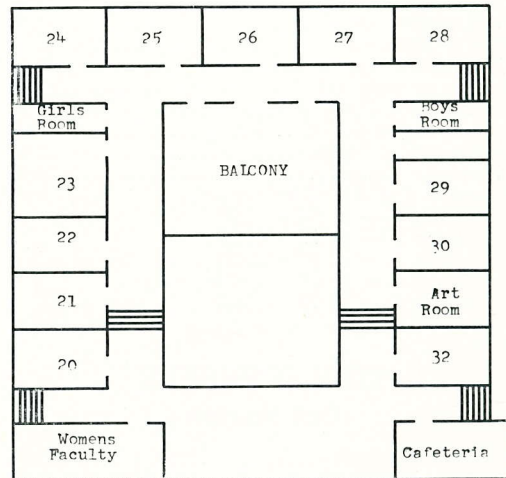
LOWER FLOOR

Student Regulations

EARLY DISMISSAL—In order to be dismissed from school early, the pupil must have a note from home approved by the Principal or Vice-Principal in advance.

GIFTS TO THE TEACHER—Members of the faculty may receive gifts from a group of students but never from an individual.

PAPER SUPPLIES—Supplies of both white and yellow paper are to be obtained from home room teachers. **DO NOT ASK ANYONE IN THE OFFICE.**

PHYSICAL EDUCATION—The law requires that all pupils must take physical education unless excused by written orders from a doctor. Such excuses are to be kept on file by the physical education instructors. Even though excused from active physical participation, students are required to attend the classes.

ILLNESS—In case of illness in the classroom, the office must be notified. No student is to go to the Medical Room at any time unless permission is first received from the office. He is then to sign his name to a list, recording the time of entering and leaving the Medical Room.

STUDENTS WHO BECOME ILL IN SCHOOL AND WISH TO GO HOME, MUST REPORT TO THE OFFICE FOR THAT PERMISSION. THOSE WHO FAIL TO REPORT WILL BE CONSIDERED TRUANT.

INJURIES—If a student is injured at school, he should *immediately* notify the teacher in charge. The teacher will in turn notify the office so that the school doctor or nurse can be called.

CORRIDORS—When students are dressed after having gym, they are *not* to wait in the hall or go to lockers. They must wait in gym until passed to next class.

ABSENCE—If any pupil is absent from school for any reason, the parent or guardian must call the school the morning of the first day of absence. A note must be brought from the parent explaining the reasons for absence on the first day of return to classes. This statement is to be submitted to the Vice Principal before 8:28 on the first day of return. If the student has an excused absence, he may make up the worked missed, otherwise an "F" is given.

Students who are absent because of a contagious Disease must secure a release slip from the Board of Health of the town in which they live.

PUNCTUALITY—Tardiness is too frequently a habit. When such is the case, it is inexcusable. Students tardy to homeroom should have a pass from the office, all other tardiness will be handled by the teachers.

SMOKING—Smoking within the school or on school property is absolutely forbidden. Failure to comply with this rule will result in suspension.

LOST & FOUND—Students have the responsibility of checking for any lost articles and books in the office.

STUDY HALL REGULATIONS—Silence is to be maintained at all times in study halls.

FIRE DRILLS—At the ringing of the alarm, students are to stand at attention.

The teacher will give the command to pass rapidly.

The teacher will leave the room last and close the door.

Every student must leave the building during fire drills.

Students from classrooms which use the side entrance should go down the sidewalk and should not be on the lawn.

Students who leave by the front door are NOT to remain on the steps.

At the ringing of two bells, students are to return directly and in an orderly fashion to their assignments without stopping at the restrooms or fountains.

From time to time fire drills will be held with exits blocked.

Students should leave by the nearest exit as quickly as possible.

INCLEMENT WEATHER FIRE DRILLS—Students are to report to their lockers for their wraps and leave by the nearest exit in a quiet, orderly fashion making sure they clear the building.

NURSE—The nurse will be in the high school daily. Students must report to the office for a pass in order to secure the services of the nurse.

STUDENTS IN THE BUILDING—Pupils are not permitted in the building when school is not in session unless they are in the company of a teacher.

PIANO—The piano in the auditorium is to be played only with the permission of a faculty member and under supervision.

LUNCH REGULATIONS—All students wishing to purchase lunch and/or dessert are to form a single line at the left-hand door approaching the serving area.

Students wishing to purchase milk or ice cream, form a single line at the milk cooler located in the dining area. These students are *not* to go through the serving line.

Trays and dishes are to be taken to the window at the dish-washing room:

1. Place all papers in containers provided there.
2. Place all silver in the pan on the counter.
3. Place all dishes on the counter.
4. Place the tray on the appropriate pile.

Students passing to and from the cafeteria must receive from the teachers on duty a specific pass entitling them to use the lavatory facilities on the second floor only. There shall be no loitering in the halls or lavatories at any time. In passing through the hall of the upper floor complete quiet must be maintained because classes will be held in the various rooms on that floor and must not be disturbed.

TEXTBOOKS—All pupils of Bogota High School are furnished with books free of charge. They are expected to be returned at the end of the school year in the same condition, subject to reasonable wear, as they were when received. All books must be covered. If a student loses a textbook, a new one will be issued immediately. If the old book is not found within one week the fine for the lost book must be paid at that time.

LOCKERS—Each pupil will be assigned a locker for wraps and books. Where locks are not present they may be purchased at a price of 90¢ each. Pupils are responsible for keeping the lockers neat and orderly, and locked at all times. If a locker cannot be opened, the condition must be reported immediately to the office. There will be periodic inspection of lockers by the teachers.

LEAVING SCHOOL—A student may not leave school property while school is in session, unless he has received permission from the principal.

CONDUCT IN THE HALLS—All students should pass quickly and quietly and conduct themselves in an orderly manner when passing from class to class. Students must not be in the hall while classes are in session without a pass signed by a teacher.

DEFACING AND DAMAGING SCHOOL PROPERTY—Students found defacing or damaging school property shall be sent immediately to the office, where suitable action will be taken. In all cases a student will be fined for damage to school property.

MAYWOOD STUDENTS' BUS REGULATIONS—All Maywood students will be assigned specific buses. These buses will discharge and pick up the students at specified places on Palisade Avenue adjacent to Kovar Street. Students will be expected to enter the buses assigned to them and depart from them in a quiet and orderly manner.

Any student who remains after 2:50 to participate in extra curricular activities or who is detained by a teacher may secure Public Service Bus ticket upon presentation of Identification Card to the teacher who has detained him.

INSURANCE—It is possible for each student to purchase accident insurance covering injuries which occur during school hours, while participating in school sponsored and supervised activities either away from the school premises or after school hours, and while traveling to and from school. This includes all physical education, playground, shop or other school activities.

DETENTION—Detention is held in room 1 Monday through Thursday. A student assigned to detention is to report at 2:55 and be dismissed at 3:25. Students are to have work with them sufficient to occupy the time for at least one-half hour.

DAILY BULLETIN—A daily bulletin containing information of importance to students will be read in home room. Information relative to job opportunities, deadline dates for college admission, applications for scholarships, applications for college entrance examination board tests, special announcements relative to school activities and other items of concern to students are contained in this bulletin. The daily bulletins are posted on home room bulletin boards. A student returning to school after absence should consult the posted bulletins so as not to miss any essential information.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

Report Cards

Report cards are distributed every six weeks.

The scale of grades is as follows:

A—excellent	F—failure
B—good	P—pass (in music and
C—average	physical education)
D—below average	S—superior (music)
but passing	

A student could fail a course if he did not successfully complete the required book reports, term papers, lab sheets, or other assigned projects.

Deficiency and Warning Slips

Two weeks prior to the end of the marking period, teachers prepare deficiency slips or warning slips for students who are failing at that time or whose grades are close to failing. These slips indicate the reasons for lack of success and contain suggestions for improvement. Copies are mailed to parents of these students.

Honor Roll

In order to be on the first honor roll, a student must receive all "A's" in major subjects and no mark below a "C" in minor subjects.

In order to be on the second honor roll, a student must receive at least two "A's" in major subjects, the remainder of major subject grades must be "B," and there shall be no mark below a "C" in minor subjects.

A student may not be on either honor roll with an "incomplete" mark, even though the remainder of his grades would qualify him.

CURRICULA

The curricular offerings are designed to meet the needs, interests and abilities of the individual student. In the interest of assisting students in selection of courses, the offerings are grouped into three general patterns:

ACADEMIC: For those preparing for admission to an institution of higher learning;

BUSINESS: For those planning to enter the business world;

GENERAL: For those desiring a general education or preparation for a field not covered in the other two courses.

These patterns in no way indicate requirements. Each student will be scheduled in accordance with his own needs and abilities. This will be accomplished through Guidance Department conferences with the student, and, when desirable, the student's parents. No student is restricted from any course he wishes to pursue. Only his measure of success will help or hinder his progressive development in a specific sequential advancement. On the advice or recommendation of his teacher or guidance counselor, he may be encouraged to apply himself in certain areas and/or eliminate other areas of study.

Any change of schedule must be approved by the Guidance Department. No pupil may drop a subject except with the approval of the parents, the teacher, and the Guidance Department.

NOTE:

1. Eighty points are required for graduation.
(A student may enter the 10th grade upon completion of 16 points of credit, the 11th grade upon completion of 35, and the 12th upon completion of 56.)
2. Each student is required to take four major (5 point) subjects per year.
3. Each student is required to pass four years of English, two years of United States History, and four years of Physical Education (unless excused for medical reasons) to qualify for a diploma.
4. Special subjects carry one-half point credit for each period a week taken.
Industrial Arts and Mechanical Drawing may be elected for two or more periods weekly.
The following special subjects, if elected by the student must be taken for five days per week: Art, Band, Chef's Class, Choir, Glee Club, General Music, Clothing, Home Economics, Homemaking—Child Care, and Typing. (Typing is non-elective in the ninth grade.)
5. **COLLEGE**—Although Bogota High School is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and is approved by the New Jersey State Department of Education, graduation alone does not necessarily qualify the graduate for any college because colleges differ in their requirements and standards. Care, therefore, must be used in the selection of subjects; and grades of "B"

or better must be maintained for recommendation to many colleges.

6. The study of any foreign language may be started in the ninth, tenth or eleventh grades. This makes it possible for a student to complete during his high school career two, three, or four years of a language in accordance with his needs and interests. It should be noted that colleges will not accept for entrance credit less than two years' study of a language. Some colleges are insisting on the third year of a language as an admission requirement.
7. Students who hope to follow a career in science, mathematics, or engineering will find it helpful to complete four years of both science and mathematics.
8. Those who desire to prepare for a career as a secretary should follow the business offerings, definitely electing two years of typing, two years of stenography, and secretarial training.

Library Hours

The library is open daily from 8:15 to 3:45 except for the librarian's lunch period.

Library Rules

1. Books may be borrowed for two weeks unless otherwise restricted.
2. A fine of two cents a day will be charged for each book kept overdue. All damages to books and all losses of books shall be paid for.
3. *Reserved* books may be borrowed for overnight use only—and must be returned before *first period* the following morning.
4. Reference books may not be taken from the library.
5. Pupils may use the library during their study periods.
6. In order to respect the rights of others, students are expected to be quiet at all times.

Band

The Bogota High School Band, which has an average membership of sixty or more students each year, is open to any interested student who meets the playing requirements and standards set up by the band director.

The band rehearses eighth period every day and engages in many varied activities, including marching festivals, special assembly programs, and concerts. Scheduled trips, joint concerts with other high schools and out-of-town performances contribute toward a very active, entertaining, and satisfactory experience for each student member of the band.

Requirements for Members of the Band

1. All members are expected to perform at all functions in which the band participates: football games, concerts, school plays, Memorial Day Parade, Graduation Exercises, special activities such as Clifton Band Festival and any assemblies.

Failure to participate in any of these activities, unless excused in advance by the Band Director, will result in expulsion from the band.

2. All members of the band are expected to dress properly at all times, and especially when in uniform. Regulation dress requires white shoes, white socks, uniform properly buttoned at all times, and hat in good condition and properly worn.

Failure to comply with the regulations above may result in forfeiting any award.

3. Band awards will be issued on the basis of attendance, cooperation and dependability.

a. Letters are given to any band member who attends and performs at all required activities for two consecutive years. This award will be made in the fall semester.

b. Band pins are awarded only to those seniors who have been faithful band members throughout their high school years. This award will be given in the spring.

4. All band members receive $2\frac{1}{2}$ points of credit for five scheduled band periods per week. Additional credits totalling three points per year may be earned by submitting evidence from a teacher that private instrumental music lessons are in progress and further submitting a note from home that one hour of daily practice is being observed. Any student who enrolls in this program is required to perform for the Band Director at the beginning and at the end of the year.

General Music

This class will meet daily and engage in a wide variety of music activities. These activities will include: singing in unison and part songs, listening to music through all media; recordings, films, live performances, by school groups and artists outside school, television and radio; rhythmic experiences, both creative and directed, instrumental experiences, discussion and reports on concerts, radio, television, musical movies, assembly programs, preparation for listening through the use of books, magazines, newspapers, etc.

The emphasis placed upon each category and the order of presentation will depend upon the over-all background of musical experiences, the abilities and interests of the different classes being taught. This class is open to any interested student.

Girls' Glee Club

The Girls' Glee Club is open to any interested high school girl with little or no choral background. This group will engage in three and four part singing and will be expected to perform at functions and concerts designated by the director.

Senior Choir

This elective group is made up of students who have had at least one year of high school choral music. Students usually progress from the Senior Choir to the A Cappella Choir. The Senior Choir rehearses daily and engages in a variety of musical activities, including school assemblies, county festivals, community programs, and concerts. Scheduled trips and exchange high school choral programs are arranged to stimulate and create satisfying musical experiences for each student.

A Cappella Choir

This group, which has a limited enrollment, is open to those who have met requirements in sight

singing, ear training, responsibility and self-discipline as set up by the choir director. Membership is limited to those students who have had at least one year's experience in choral music. Scheduled trips and exchange high school choral programs are arranged to stimulate and create satisfying experiences for each student.

Requirements for Members of the Choir

All members are expected to perform at all functions in which the choir participates: concerts, assembly programs, and special activities such as the Bergen County Choral Festival.

Failure to participate in any of these activities, unless excused in advance by the Choir Director, will result in expulsion from the choir.

Choir members are expected to dress properly at all times and the following regulations shall be in effect for all performances unless specifically changed by the Director. Boys shall wear suits, white shirts and ties, and girls shall wear white blouses and black skirts.

Failure to comply with the above regulations at the time of any program may result in forfeiting a choir award for the year.

Choir awards are given on the basis of attendance and performance in a cooperative and dependable manner at all required activities for three successive years.

All choir members will receive 2½ points for the five scheduled choir periods per week. Additional points totalling three credits may be earned by those students who submit evidence of private vocal or piano lessons and presentation of a note from home stipulating that one hour of daily practice is being observed. The students who wish to enroll in such a program must perform for the vocal music director at the beginning and at the end of the school year.

Ensemble Units

From time to time, depending upon the schedule available, groups of students who have particular desire to be members of small musical programs have, with the music instructors formed quartets, double quartets, and similar ensemble units. Naturally, the types of these units change annually. They, too, present many programs to assemblies, participate in concerts both in Bogota and elsewhere.

ANNUAL EVENTS

ORATORICAL CONTEST—The oratorical contest is held annually among competing speakers from the school chosen by the public speaking department for their ability to speak on some phase of the constitution.

SENIOR CLASS PLAY—The senior class produces one three-act play during the year.

THANKSGIVING DAY—The annual football game held on Thanksgiving Day between Ridgefield Park and Bogota is the biggest athletic event of the year.

ONE-ACT PLAY CONTEST—A contest is held each year in which each class presents a one-act play. The winning play is selected by a group of judges.

SOPHOMORE HOP—In November the sophomore class presents its dance in the school gym. The decorations, band, and refreshments are arranged by the Sophomore Dance Committee and dress is semi-formal.

SENIOR PROM—Bogota's only formal dance, is held in the beginning of May. With the help of the class advisors, the Prom Committee decides the location of the dance, the price of the bid (which includes a dinner), and the selection of the band.

JUNIOR DANCE—The Junior Dance is held soon after the completion of mid-year examinations in early February. A dance committee is appointed to work out the necessary details.

NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY INDUCTION—A candlelight induction ceremony is held during an assembly program in May at which time parents of the candidates and prominent guests are invited. A luncheon sponsored by the P.T.A. follows the ceremony.

CLASS DAY—Class Day is held the Friday before graduation on the last day of school for seniors with both parents and members of the school attending.

GRADUATION—Graduation takes place in the gymnasium on a Tuesday evening in June.

BACCALAUREATE—Baccalaureate takes place the Sunday before graduation. All graduates wear caps and gowns and assemble in the auditorium before their parents and friends for a non-denominational religious service.

CLUB ACTIVITIES

The following are clubs which have been active and which continue in accordance with student interest. From time to time other clubs are formed as students demonstrate additional interests.

ART CLUB—A club to promote greater interest in the arts. Students may use the art room and all the art mediums on hand. Members are eligible, upon payment of minimum monthly dues, to join in field trips and other functions relating to the field of art.

ASSEMBLY COMMITTEE—The assembly committee is composed of faculty and student members. The object of this committee is to select and plan assembly programs for the year and to report on the reactions of the student body to the various programs. It is sometimes necessary for the student members to participate in special programs.

COLOR GUARD—Six girls and one substitute compose the membership of the color guard. These girls perform with the band and twirlers at football games, parades and all festival performances. Try-outs are held in the spring at which time the entire squad is chosen.

FRENCH CLUB—Any student taking a French course in Bogota is eligible for membership in the French Club. The club promotes interest in developing the use of the French language and endeavors to acquaint each member with France and its people through many activities.

FUTURE TEACHERS OF AMERICA—This club is affiliated with the Student N. J. Education Association which makes it possible for members to attend conferences and conventions of F.T.A. club members throughout the state. The purpose of the club is to foster interest in the teaching profession, to learn more about colleges for teachers, and to cultivate the qualities of leadership, scholarship and character. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors may apply for membership.

G.A.C.—Any girl in Bogota High is eligible for membership in G.A.C. Applications for membership in G.A.C. are made near the end of the year and the applications voted upon by the members. Members are selected on the basis of interest in athletics (girls must participate in at least one intramural sport a year), leadership, dependability,

cooperation and ability. The purpose of the Athletic Council is to assist in the organization and promotion of athletics through intramurals, playdays and sport sprees; to develop leadership and initiative through the athletic program; and to assist in conducting all gym classes. Recognition is given the officers and managers of GAC by granting certain points toward intramural awards. The president of GAC receives 15 points; all other officers receive 10 points and all managers receive 5 points toward their awards.

In April, the GAC sponsors a turn-about dance in the school gym.

HI-Y—The Hi-Y is a service organization affiliated with the Bergen County Young Men's Christian Association. Membership is open to Sophomore and Junior boys interested in being of service to their school and community, subject to approval by the membership and sponsor.

KLAXON—*The Klaxon* is the official Bogota High School newspaper. Its staff members consist of students who are interested in newspaper work as a hobby or as a career. Since the membership is limited, applications should be submitted to the advisor as early in the school year as possible.

LIBRARY COUNCIL—Members of the Council assist in the school library. Any student interested in library work as a profession or in books and reading is eligible. Members must have free periods to devote to the library work.

THE NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY—The National Honor Society is composed of 15% of the senior class who to be scholastically eligible must have a 3 or B average and 5% of the junior

class who to be scholastically eligible must have a 3.5 average. All students eligible academically and all members of the faculty participate in the election of members based on service, character and leadership.

OUTLOOK—"Outlook" is the Bogota High School's magazine. The staff welcomes all students interested in creative writing, art work, and other phases of magazine production.

PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB—Basic techniques in photography, including developing and enlarging, are applied by the member of this club.

PROJECTIONIST CLUB—Membership is open to all interested in operating visual aids equipment.

PURPLE B—The Yearbook staff is open to members of the senior class who are interested in publishing the school yearbook. Juniors and sophomores who are especially interested in this field may make application to assist as a training period.

REFEREES' CLUB—Any girl in Bogota High School is eligible for membership in this club. Members are trained in the techniques of officiating and are also given a fundamental knowledge of rules. Membership is limited to 20 girls.

SCIENCE CLUB—All students interested in science projects, experiments and activities beyond those done in the regular science classes, are invited to join this club.

SPANISH CLUB—Students who are studying Spanish or have studied Spanish are eligible. The purpose of the club is to acquire a greater degree of fluency in conversational Spanish and to learn more of the music and culture of Spanish-speaking countries.

STAGE CREW—Members of the stage crew assist in making sets for the various dramatic productions, and assist in all other functions necessary during a dramatic productions.

TRI-HI-Y—The Tri-Hi-Y is a service club and is affiliated with the Bergen County Y.M.C.A. In order to be eligible, one must be a sophomore or junior and have no less than a C average. New members are selected by the present members of the Tri-Hi-Y. This club performs many useful services for the school and the community.

VARSITY "B" CLUB—An organization whose purpose is to foster, maintain and support high standards of athletic conduct, and to encourage sportsmanship and school spirit. Junior and senior letter winners are eligible to become members.

ATHLETICS

Bogota High School is a member of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association and a member of the Bergen County Scholastic League.

The athletic program of the school is regulated and controlled by the Athletic Association under the direction and supervision of the Director of Athletics, Mr. Robert Sturges.

A student is eligible for varsity athletic competition if he meets each of the following qualifications:

1. He shall be a registered student.
2. He shall be under 19 years of age at the beginning of the sport season.
3. To be eligible for athletic competition during the 1st semester, he shall have received passing grades in the previous school year totaling at least 15 points of credit.
4. To be eligible for athletic competition during the second semester, he shall have received passing grades in the 1st semester totaling at least $7\frac{1}{2}$ points of credit.
5. He shall be an amateur.
6. No student shall be eligible for high school athletics after the expiration of six consecutive semesters following his entrance if he enters as a sophomore, or eight consecutive semesters if he enters as a freshman.
7. A transfer student is automatically ineligible to compete for a period of one year from the date of his registration. (except where there was a change of residence into the district.)
8. A student who is eligible at the beginning of a sports' season shall be allowed to finish that season.
9. He shall have his parents' written consent.
10. He must undergo a thorough physical examination which is given by the team physician.

The following are the Training Rules and Rules of Conduct defined and enacted by the Varsity Club and coaching staffs:

1. No smoking and/or carrying tobacco of any kind. Penalty for violation—immediate dismissal from the squad.

2. No drinking of any alcoholic beverages. Penalty for violation—immediate dismissal from squad.

3. Unexcused absences totaling two (2) will mean dismissal from the squad. Anyone who wishes to be excused from a particular practice or game must contact his coach personally beforehand and state his reasons for having to be absent.

4. Habitual lateness for any reason (including detention) will not be tolerated. Offenders may be dropped from squad at the discretion of the coach.

5. Bed-time as prescribed by individual coaches will be observed. Violation of such a curfew will mean that the player involved will not "suit-up" for the next game.

6. Obscene or profane language will not be tolerated.

7. Gambling on the outcome of a game or a player's performance is forbidden.

8. Defacing school property or the property of any other school, stealing team equipment or equipment from other schools will mean immediate dismissal from the squad and will be referred to the school administrators for further action.

9. In general, Bogota High School athletes are to conduct themselves in an exemplary manner.

BOYS' INTRAMURAL SPORTS

The High School intramural program is conducted for those students who are not members of varsity or junior varsity athletic teams. It is felt that the many physical and sociological benefits derived through individual and team competition should reach as many students as possible, and all students are urged to participate in some phase of the program.

The boys' program usually includes such activities as: volley ball, basketball, wrestling, bowling, stunts and tumbling, softball.

GIRLS' INTRAMURAL SPORTS

Bogota High School offers after-school intramurals to any girl who is interested. The girls pick their own teams according to classes—freshman, sophomore, etc.

By participating in sports, the girls are eligible for school awards consisting of freshman key, a chenille numeral, and a "B". The highest award is a "B" with a stripe.

All awards are given according to points accumulated by the girls during their years in school.

Games are played every Tuesday and Thursday.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council is the governing body of the school and is responsible for all projects necessary for the general welfare of the student body except in those areas which must be handled by the administration. It is comprised of one representative from each homeroom and five officers, the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and assistant secretary. The president not only presides at student council meetings, but also at meetings of the entire student body such as assembly programs. Elections are held each year in the middle of May for the positions of president, vice-president, treasurer, and assistant secretary. The assistant secretary moves up each year to the position of secretary.

One annual project of the student council is the support of a Korean orphan. Each week one homeroom will write to the child, and during Christmas a present is purchased and sent to the child.

PREAMBLE AND CONSTITUTION OF STUDENT ORGANIZATION OF BOGOTA HIGH SCHOOL

We, the students of Bogota High School, unite in the formulation, adoption and support of this constitution for the following purposes:

1. To foster, maintain and support good school citizenship.
2. To encourage a spirit of cooperation among students and faculty.
3. To harmonize the various authorized school activities and to secure for them the united support of all.
4. To establish and maintain a system of democratic student government in Bogota High School;

in so doing to advance our opportunities in the development of character, will power, self-control, initiative, and responsibility.

5. To maintain a forum for the discussion of questions of interest to the student body.

We recognize that any organization, if it is successful, must be adequately governed and controlled. We realize that the responsibility for the control of our school rests with the principal and teachers, and that any part of this control delegated to the students is a trust. We shall prove ourselves worthy of this trust through constant effort on our part to maintain high standards in all activities of school life. It is our purpose to hold the welfare and good name of Bogota High School above selfish interests.

ARTICLE I

Name

Sec. 1. The name of this organization shall be the Student Organization of Bogota High School.

ARTICLE II

Organization

Sec. 1. All undergraduate students who abide by this constitution shall be members of this organization.

Sec. 2. The executive power of this association shall be vested in a Student Council consisting of president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, assistant secretary, principal, faculty advisor, and a representative from each home room.

Sec. 3. A representative from each homeroom to the Student Council must satisfy the following requirements:

- a. He must have a record of reliability.
- b. He must hold interest in the welfare of the school above interests of self or those of class.
- c. Three unexcused absences of any homeroom will result in expulsion of the representative from the Student Council.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of every representative to:

- a. Assume the responsibility of leadership.
- b. Bring to the Council suggestions for the betterment of the work of the school.
- c. Attend all regular and called meetings unless excused by the President or represented by his alternate.
- d. Report to his homeroom the action taken by the Council on various matters.
- e. Serve on any committee to which he may be assigned.

Sec. 5. The method to be followed in the election of the Student Council officers shall be as follows:

- a. The Student Council will elect a nominating committee consisting of the officers; two senior class members of the Council; two junior class members of the Council; two sophomore class members of the Council; and one freshman class member of the Council.

This nominating committee shall choose eligible candidates for the offices of president, vice-president, treasurer, and assistant secretary.

The nominating committee shall choose only two candidates for each office. Students wishing to run for an office, though not selected by the nominating committee, may be placed on the ballot by obtaining a petition signed by fifty students and by having this petition either accepted or rejected by the original committee, plus the Council advisor and the Principal.

- b. The elections before the entire school body will not be held later than the third regular meeting in May of each school year.

- c. Campaigns for President and other officers shall be held one week prior to the election, with restrictions governed by the Student Council.

Sec. 6. The Student Council shall appoint election judges and determine the place to hold the election.

Sec. 7. In the event that any officer does not assume office at the beginning of the new school year, the Student Council will adopt any means suitable to the student body for the refilling of that office.

ARTICLE III

Officers

Sec. 1. The officers of the student organization shall be president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and assistant secretary and shall serve in the same capacities in the Student Council.

Sec. 2. The officers of each class in the Bogota High School shall be president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, and shall include at least one faculty advisor. The faculty advisor or advisors shall be appointed by the principal at the beginning of each school year.

Sec. 3. The president of the student organization shall preside at all regular and called meetings of the student body for the transaction of school business, as well as at meetings of the Student Council. He shall be a member of the twelfth grade and must have at least one year's resident work in Bogota High School. He shall hold no presidency of a class or any other organization in the high school nor shall he hold the position of editor on the school paper or yearbook. He shall call a meeting of the Student Council at the request of any member. He shall call meetings

of the student body with the approval of the principal. He shall act as representative of the student body to any visitor to the school.

Sec. 4. The vice-president shall be a member of the eleventh grade. He shall preside in the absence of the president and shall assist him whenever necessary.

Sec. 5. The secretary shall be a member of the twelfth grade. He shall write the minutes of all student council and student body meetings, shall attend to all correspondence of these organizations, and shall notify all members of the Student Council of all called meetings.

Sec. 6. The assistant secretary shall be a member of the eleventh grade and shall be required to attend all meetings in the capacity of observer in preparation for assuming the duties of secretary for the next school year.

Sec. 7. The treasurer shall be a member of the twelfth grade. He shall keep an accurate account of the organization's finances and shall deposit and disburse moneys at the direction of the organization.

Sec. 8. The tenure of office of all student officers in the school shall be for one school year.

ARTICLE IV

Powers

Sec. 1. The Student Council shall have the following legislative powers:

- a. To pass and enforce laws necessary to the general welfare of the school.

- b. To authorize the expenditure of Student Council funds provided the Student Council passes the expenditure by a favorable vote of at least two-thirds.
- c. To grant approval to new clubs and organizations in the school.
- d. To adjust such difficulties as may arise between classes, societies, or other organizations within Bogota High School or between organizations of this school and similar organizations of other schools.

Sec. 2. The Student Council shall have the jurisdiction to assume such powers and duties in matters of discipline and conduct as are assigned it by the principal of Bogota High School. The system used in the execution of such duties and powers shall be determined by the Council.

Sec. 3. Any regulation involving cooperation of the entire school may be referred to the Student Organization for a referendum vote;

- a. To approve or to veto all decisions made by the Student Council or referendum vote.
- b. To decide all questions not provided for in this Constitution.

ARTICLE V

Committees

Sec. 1. The Student Council shall appoint any committees which it deems necessary for the benefit of the entire school body.

Sec. 2. The President will select a committee for a special purpose and appoint a chairman from those selected.

Sec. 3. All committees must submit a written report to the secretary to be filed for future reference.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. This Constitution may be amended in the following manner:

- a. The proposed amendment must be submitted in writing to the Student Council one week before it is voted upon by that body.
- b. An affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the Student Council shall be required before submission of the proposed amendment to the Student Organization.
- c. An amendment to the Constitution must be accepted by a two-thirds vote of the student body before going into effect.

BYLAWS AND RULES

ARTICLE I

Sec. 1. Two-thirds of its membership shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business in the student organization or in the Student Council.

Sec. 2. An amendment of these laws may be made under the rule given in ARTICLE VI, Sec. 1 of this Constitution.

Sec. 3. All business meetings shall be conducted according to Parliamentary procedure.

ARTICLE II

Eligibility

Eligibility rules of the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association shall govern eligibility for Bogota High School teams and team members.

Sec. 1. The power to award the right to wear any school emblems upon the recommendation of the coaches shall be vested in the Varsity "B" club.

Sec. 2. To participate in any interscholastic games, a student must obtain the written consent of his parents, and either pass a medical examination by the school's doctor or present a doctor's certificate.

Sec. 3. To be recommended for a school letter in any sport a candidate shall have shown by his spirit and attitude that he merits the recognition of the school; he shall have been regular in his attendance at practices, faithful in training, and shall not have played on any outside teams without the consent of the coach. He must also have completed one of the following requirements:

- a. Football.
Participated in one more than one-half of the quarters played.
- b. Basketball.
Participated in one more than one-half of the quarters played.
- c. Baseball.
Participated in one more than one-half of the total number of innings played.
- d. Track.
Received ten or more points in interscholastic meets or placed in the league championship.
- e. Bowling.
Participated in one more than half the games bowled.
- f. Special cases. (injured players, etc.)
Receive a letter on recommendation of the coach to the Student Council.
- g. A letter may be awarded on recommendation of a coach to a graduating senior boy, who has been out for a sport three or more years, been faithful in practice and training, and has cooperated in all duties asked of him.
- h. All boys winning a varsity letter will be awarded an eight-inch B.

ARTICLE III

Managers

Sec. 1. There may be one but not more than two senior managers in each sport to be appointed by the respective coaches.

Sec. 2. A senior manager must be recommended for his letter by the coach to the Student Council.

ARTICLE IV

Cheerleaders

Sec. 1. There may be ten varsity cheerleaders. The junior varsity cheering squad will be composed of eight regular members, none of whom will be a senior.

Sec. 2. Candidates shall try out before judges in the presence of the student body.

a. Judges.

Candidates shall try out before a judging committee composed of six students, three faculty members, and one outside judge.

b. The student committee will be composed of two student council officers and one representative of each class from the Student Council. If any officer is a candidate for the cheering squad, her place will be substituted by another member of the Student Council.

c. Varsity letters will be awarded at the conclusion of the school year to all members of the varsity cheering squad.

ARTICLE V

Twirling and Color Guard

Sec. 1. The twirling squad will consist of eight members and two substitutes.

Sec. 2. Candidates shall try out before an advisory committee composed of senior twirlers, senior color guard members, student council officers, the twirling advisor, the band director and faculty members selected by the band director.

Candidates shall be selected by a committee composed of:

Band director, chairman

Twirling advisor

Drum Majorette (if a senior)

Head Twirler (if a senior)

Color Guard Captain (if a senior)

If any of the last three are unable to serve, the chairman may, at his discretion, appoint substitutes.

Sec. 3. Tryouts for election to the twirling squad shall be held annually and all candidates must try-out each year.

Sec. 4. A drum majorette and head twirler will be elected by the newly elected members of the twirling squad.

Sec. 5. All senior members of the twirling squad will be awarded a Varsity letter on conclusion of the senior year.

Sec. 6. There will be a color guard composed of six members and one substitute.

Sec. 7. Candidates for color guard shall try out before the same committee referred to in Sec. 2. of this Article.

Sec. 8. Senior members of the color guard will receive a varsity letter upon the recommendation of the band director.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. To be recommended for awards in girls' intramural sports a girl must fulfill the following requirements:

- a. For ninety points she receives a numeral.
- b. For one hundred seventy-five points she receives a Varsity letter B.
- c. For two hundred seventy-five points she receives an all-time certificate.
- d. The point system will be scaled accordingly by the G.A.C.

Sec. 2. A girl winning a school letter will be awarded a six-inch letter B.

Sec. 3. A referee's emblem may be awarded to a girl who has passed certain tests specified by the Referees' Club.

Sec. 4. A freshman may be awarded a key upon participation on all first teams during her freshman year since points do not count towards numerals during the freshman year.
