Court okays spanking

Public school teachers may now spank pupil against the wishes of the child's



parents according to an October ruling by the Supreme Court. The court upheld a corporal punishment and spelled out procedures to be followed by the schools. The pupils must be informed beforehand

that specific actions might warrant a spanking and that a written explanation should be furnished to a parent on request. The ruling resulted because a Gibsonville, N.C. youth who was throwing a kickball outside of designated playtime. The mother of the youth, Virginia Baker, said she had asked school authorities not to use corporal punishment because she was opposed to it and her son

The F.B.I. called shoplifting "the fastest-growing larceny in the country." It is up 23 percent since 1973. From 1960 to 1973 it rose 221 percent according to

the National Council on Crime and Delinquency. Four million shoplifters at caught each year stealing millions of dollars worth of goods according to the U.S. Commerce Department.



The department also said that for every shoplifter caught 35 others get away and the total number of shoplifting incidents might therefore be as high as 140 million a year with \$2 to \$5 billion worth of goods

stolen.







A House labor subcommittee currently

is considering an AFL-CIO-backed bill that would raise the minimum wage ever higher reaching \$3 by January, 1977.

The \$2.30 minimum marks a 10 centan-hour increase for workers covered prior to 1966 and a 20 cents per hour for those covered since 1966.

Farm workers now will receive a minimum wage of \$2 per hour, which will climb to \$2.20 next year and \$3.30





On September 5 Lynette "Squeaky" Fromme was wrestled to the ground in the lobby of a Sacremento hotel as she



pointed a gun at the President. Fromme was reported to be a close follower of convicted killer Charles Manson.

On September 22 as the President was leaving a San Francisco hotel, Sara Jane

Moore fired a shot that went five feet from the President's head. Moore was prevented from shooting again by a bystander who knocked the gun from her hand.






Despite repeated objections by the Secret Service, President Ford continued to make public appearances and greet crowds whenever possible.

Postal rates increase

Postal rates increased from 10 to 13 cents for first class mail at the beginning of the year despite legal hassles.

The rate increase was first blocked by a



lower federal court judge who said that a 1970 law requires the Postal Service to get approval of its board of governors before any rate increase can be filed with the Postal Service Commission.

Chief Justice Warren E. Burger denied a request to delay the \$2.5 billion increase in postal rates and cleared the way for the higher postage rates to begin at midnight December 31.
