And a good time was had by all.

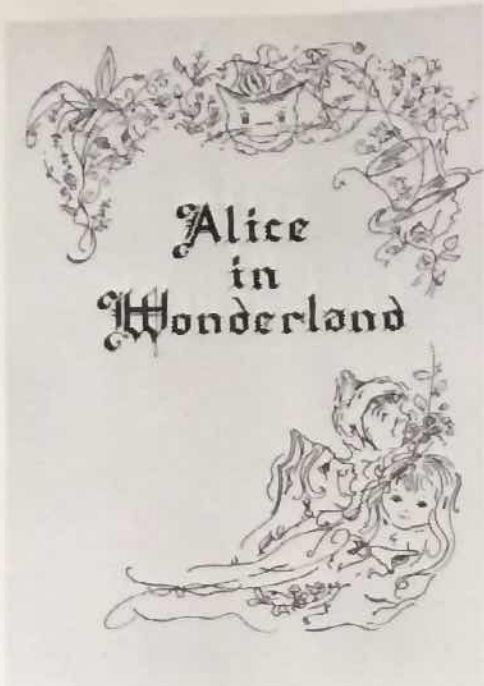

Under the auspices of the American Field Service, Marcelo Gejman, a native of Chile, spent his senior year at Framingham North High School as the guest of Richard Sharpstein and his family. The object of the American Field Service plan is for people of different countries to know and understand each other. As far as Marcelo and his schoolmates are concerned—mission accomplished.

Here, in his own words, Marcelo tells how he feels about his year in Framingham, Massachusetts, U.S.A.

"For me, together with 500 of my compatriots who applied for this scholarship, coming to the U.S. was a dream. Not everybody had the same purposes and dreams, but in my case this was a beautiful opportunity to live in a foreign country and to know people who perhaps think and act differently. Most important, this was a splendid chance to show to the U.S. people what my country is, its good and bad points, to clear up misunderstandings. I haven't found any of these, and when I go back, I hope to explain to my people how generous your country is to bring so many foreign students without any materialistic interest, only to better the understanding among nations.

How thankful I am to my American family which so affectionately received me, and to this school with all its wonderful teachers and students who were so helpful to me, and to the community of Framingham which raised the funds necessary for my trip and which gave me such a kind welcome. I am sure that this period of my life will never be out of my heart, and that I will remember this marvelous experience hour after hour, during my whole life.

Perhaps the credit that I receive for this year is not on a paper or a certificate, but it will always influence my life, through all the new ways I have learned to look at the world.

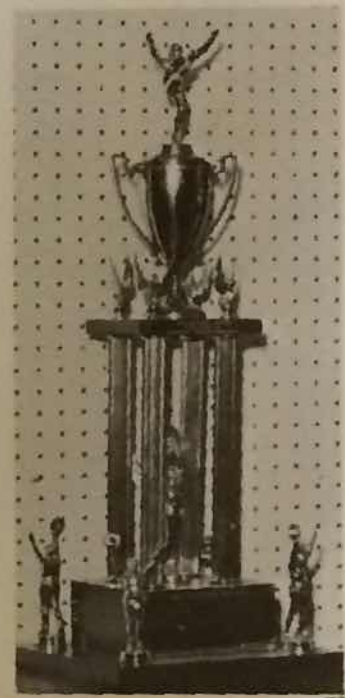

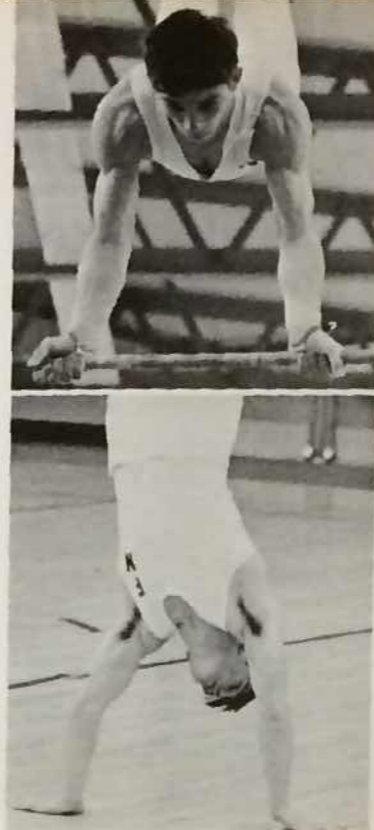
