It was a case of David killing Goliath last Friday night at Kiggins Bowl, when the Trappers conquered their cross-town rivals, Hudson's Bay, 9-0.

Playing on a field that had been soaked by a week of "monsoon" rains, the Trappers dominated play throughout the game to bury the fat and overconfident Eagles in the six inches of mud. Hoose pounced on the slippery pigskin on the Eagles 16 yard line.

Civil War Battle Ends in 0-0 Tie

The Fort Vancouver-Hudson's Bay football game finished in a dead heat Friday for the first time in the two teams' limited history.

Going into the game rated as a decided underdog, the Fort team outplayed the Eagles in every department except scoring and passing. The Trappers finished with 84 more yards on the ground and four more first downs than the Eagles. Although both teams are known for their passing, the muddy field kept the plays on the ground. 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
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



"Charred Walls Remain," "I, 150 Flee Vancouver Fire, " and "Blaze Chases Fort Students, " were only a few of the headlines which were spread throughout local newspapers as a result of Fort's fastburning fire Nov. 6.


At 8:10 am the black, choking smoke billowed through halls and the back stage area of the auditorium. Walk ways, dressing rooms, some storage rooms and parts of the bleachers in the gym were severely damaged by the flames, while classrooms received only minor smoke damage. Apparently the fire started in a dressing room underneath the stage.

While fire-fighters and nearly all city fire trucks were on the scene, students watched until school was dismissed for the day.

For the second time in four months, the Fort Vancouver auditorium was ravaged by a fire of unknown origin.

Within minutes after receiving word of the fire at 3:20 pm, four fire trucks raced to the scene. The fire was very similar to the one in November except that the stage area, left untouched from the first conflagration became the primary victim of the flames Setting decorations used in the Senior Class play were damaged extensively and the big kettle drums and the piano in the pit below the stage were charred beyond repair. The newly cleaned curtains and the stage lights were all melted and destroyed, and the walls, covered with streaks of soot, darkened the auditorium with a gloom felt by all Fort students.



The highlight of the season








