Senior Becomes U.S. Citizen

I participated in a ceremony Wednesday, Nov. 22, 1967, in which no American ever could. I was naturalized a United States citizen by Judge Robert Grant, of the United States District Court of South Bend. The procedure took place at the Indiana Club as the program for a Rotary Club meeting.

We five candidates and our guests were seated at the front of the dining room, and we had a wonderful dinner before the court session. All stood when the judge entered, and our examiner and counselor made a motion for the court to accept our applications for citizenship. The motion was granted, and the five of us stood and took our oath of allegiance and denounced our former citizenships.

My heart beat fast as the clerk read the oath, and I barely could utter the words "I do" when the time came. Surprisingly it was over before I had time to catch my breath, but the best was yet to come. We lowered our right hands, faced the judge, and waited for his address. He started out, "Fellow Citizens."

Those two words are the most important words in the English language. I originally applied for citizenship because I needed U.S. citizenship to go to college, to get into the ROTC, and to apply for financial aid. For me, the door is open, and I now realize my citizenship means much more. The judge pointed out that we must live up to the privilege that has been given us. I am now ready to make my life meaningful as a citizen of the United States of America.

U.N. is Successful

The fourth annual South Bend Model of the United Nations Assembly was called into session at 3:00 p.m. Nov. 17 in Riley's auditorium. It was an imposing spectacle that met the eye as one walked through the auditorium door. Many delegates were clothed in the native dress of their countries. Before a drawn curtain backdrop was a long white table, at which were seated the officers of the U.N. President of the Assembly was Senior Dennis Gay. Karen Brom, of Central High School, was Secretary General.

The delegates were divided into three committees. Committee #1 discussed the Arab-Israeli conflict. Chairman was a United States delegate with Brazilian delegate as rapporteur. The resolution called for a meeting of the Middle-Eastern countries in Geneva. The purpose of it would be to discuss Israel's border rights, use of international waterways, and how to deal with refugees.

The second committee's topic was striving for peace in Viet Nam. Bombing, sabotage, assassination, suspension of all troops and war material reinforcements by both sides, and the establishment of a U.N. peace-keeping force stationed in Viet Nam, Laos, and Cambodia -- all this within a week of this resolution's passage. Canadian delegate was committee #2 chairman.

The third committee discussed U.N. Charter reorganization. The resolution proposed to broaden powers of the General Assembly, provide for balance of power in the General Assembly, and change the voting procedure in the Security Council. A representative of Nigeria was chairman, and Mary Lou Johnston, of Burma, was rapporteur.

As can be expected, different delegates had different opinions on these issues.

Riley Thirteen Visit Purdue

Thirteen students from Mr. Charles T. The debate section concerns a workshop-type debating session between the Purdue debate teams.

The legislative assembly will be composed of a model House of Representatives and Senate. The Riley representatives here are Don Lerman, urban affairs committee; Dave Coffman, interior committee; and Bill Wilson, armed services committee. Dennis Gay is a senator of foreign policy.
