Junior Jim Powell captured the physical science grand prize for the second consecutive year in the South Bend Science Fair, Ginny

Jim earned his second grand prize through his work on interstellar matter illustrating theoretical analysis of the relationship between energy and gases in interstellar space. He formulated seven major conclusions through mathematics and applied logic. He was awarded a plaque which he plans to place alongside his last year's award in the awards showcase opposite the main office.

AFTER WINNING last year's city grand prize, Jim was placed in regional competition and won a special Navy award through NASA, a week's stay on a destroyer and at a naval base in Newport, Rhode Island.

Jim plans to continue his work in next year's fair in lab work involving the bombardment of gases by high speed electrons. He will also do photographic work with sky cameras and spectroscopic work. A member of the Science Club Council, Jim is the Drama Club President, a member of Thespians and Demolay, and is the Minutemen's presidential candidate in upcoming Student Council elections

sophomore Jill Weigand and Frosh Ginny Colten secured first places in the Science Fair. Jill Weigand, a participant of five years, compiled her fourth first-place entry with her project on "2-4-D as a Plant Growth Regulator" this year. Ginny's project was based on "Finite Number Systems."


These two juniors will compete nationally by taking a test and writing another impromptu theme, as well as sending some composition in prose or verse to the state committee judge.
