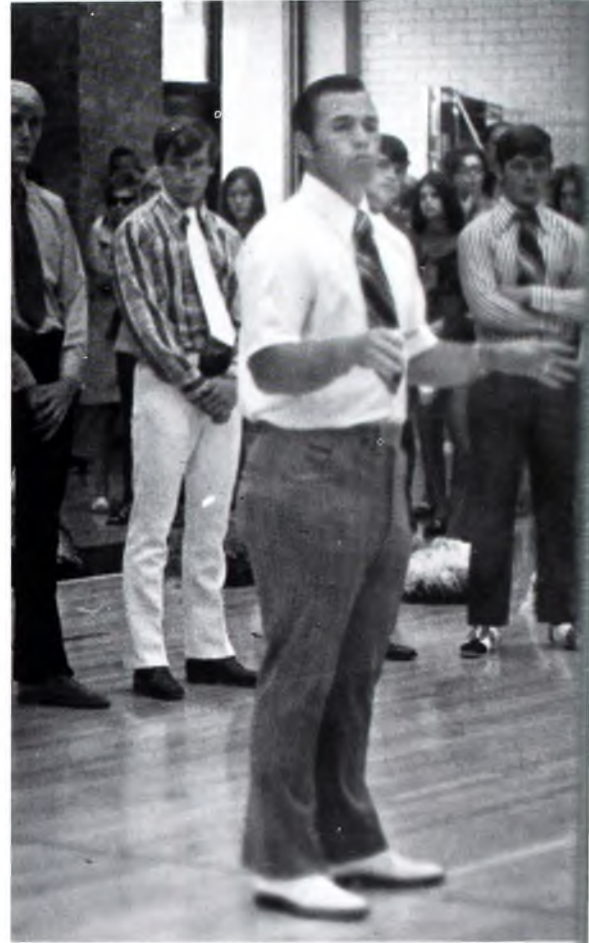

## "YOUTH" EVIDENT IN FACULTY

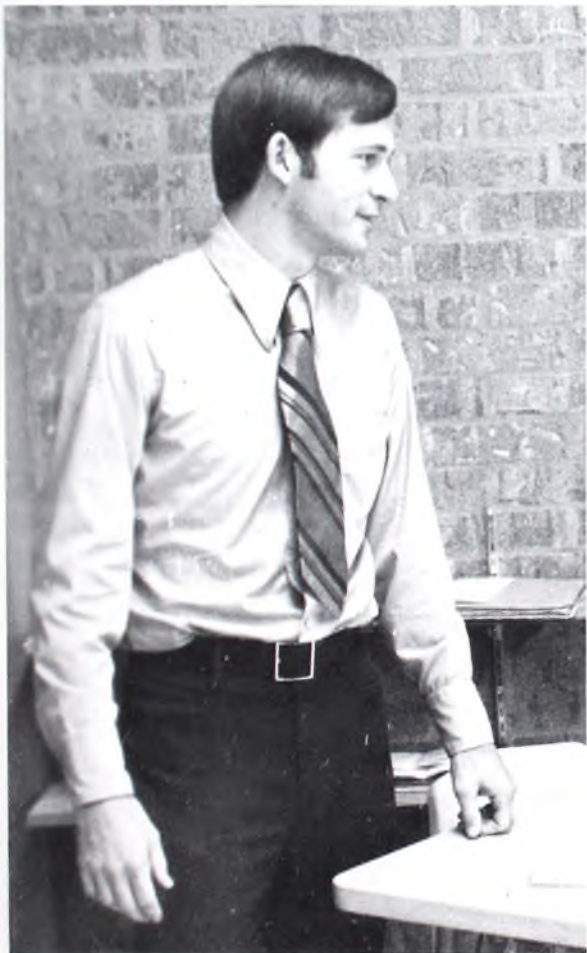

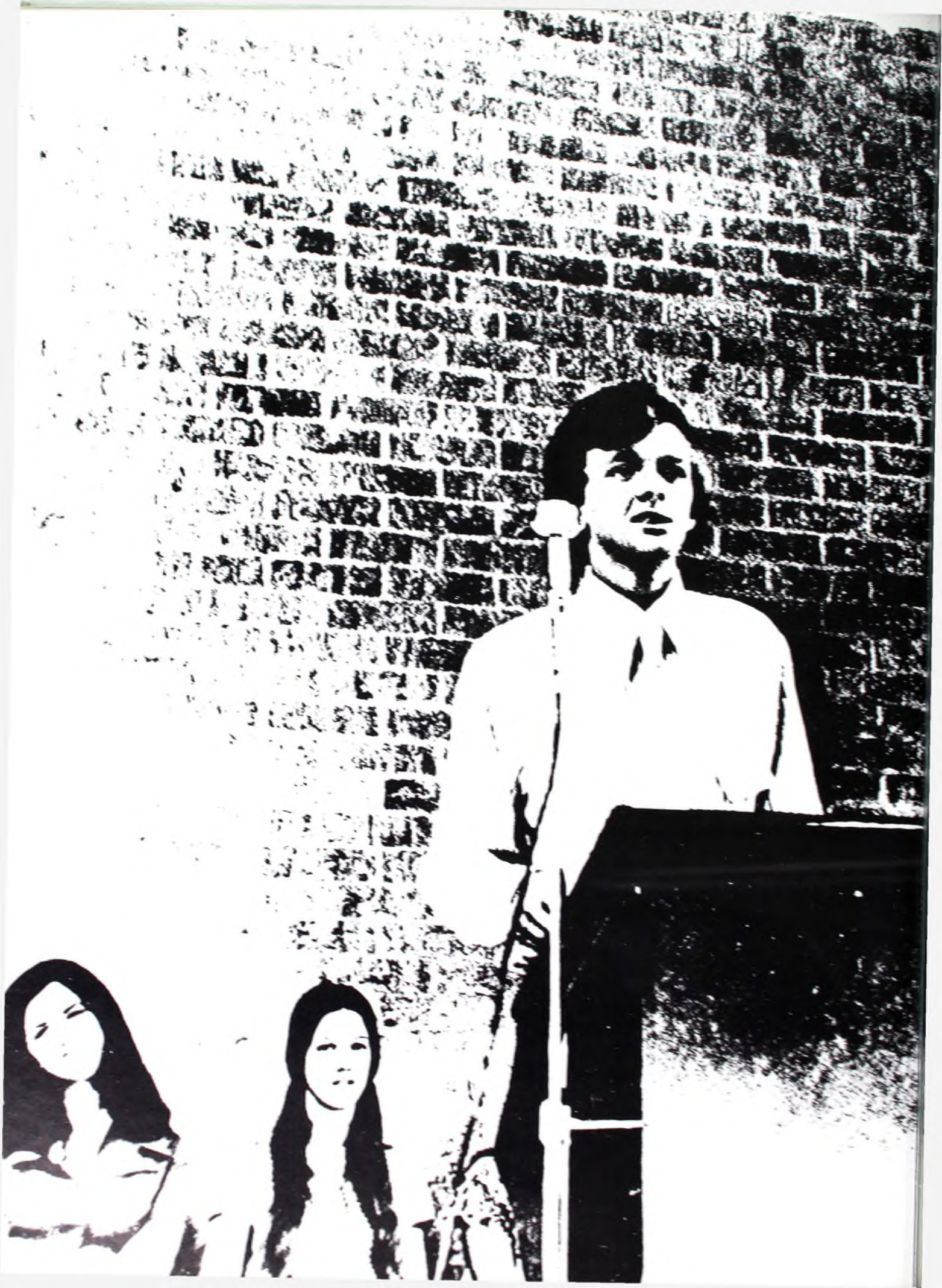

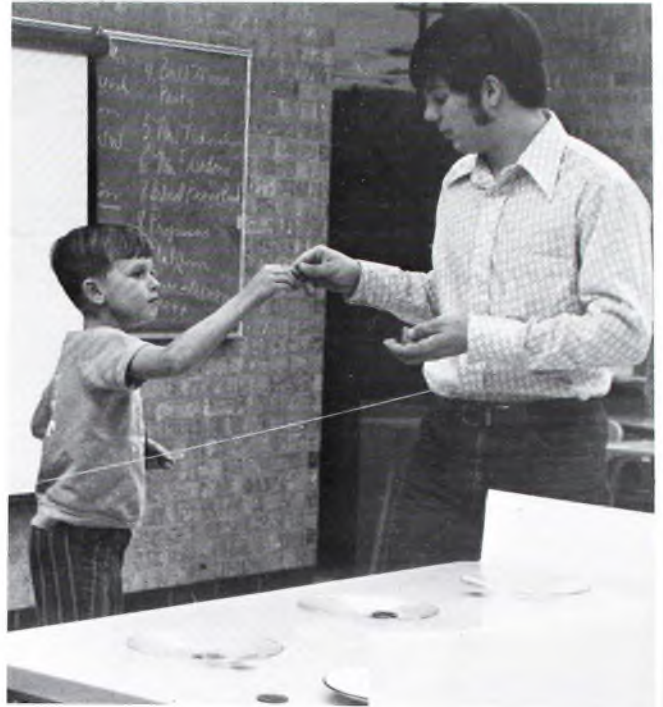
This year's Slave Day, as past ones, made money for the Student Council through the auctioning of students as "slaves for a day."

In April, the Band attended the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo and was chosen to be the Outstanding Band in Class AA.

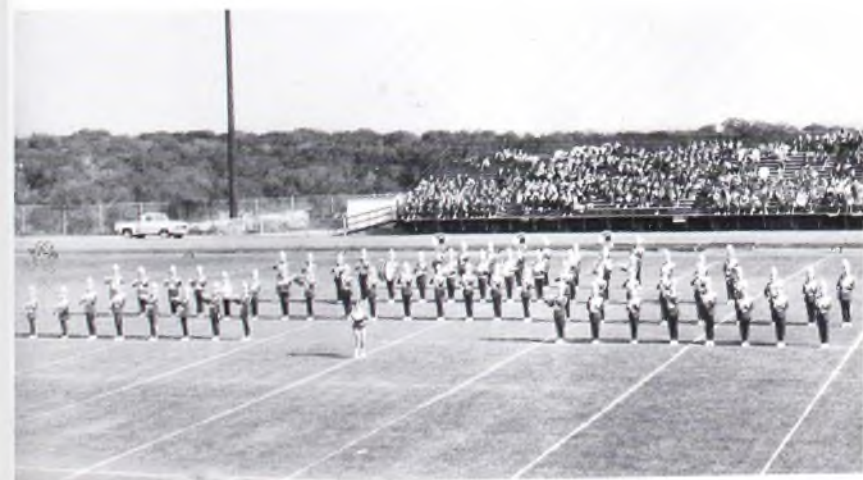

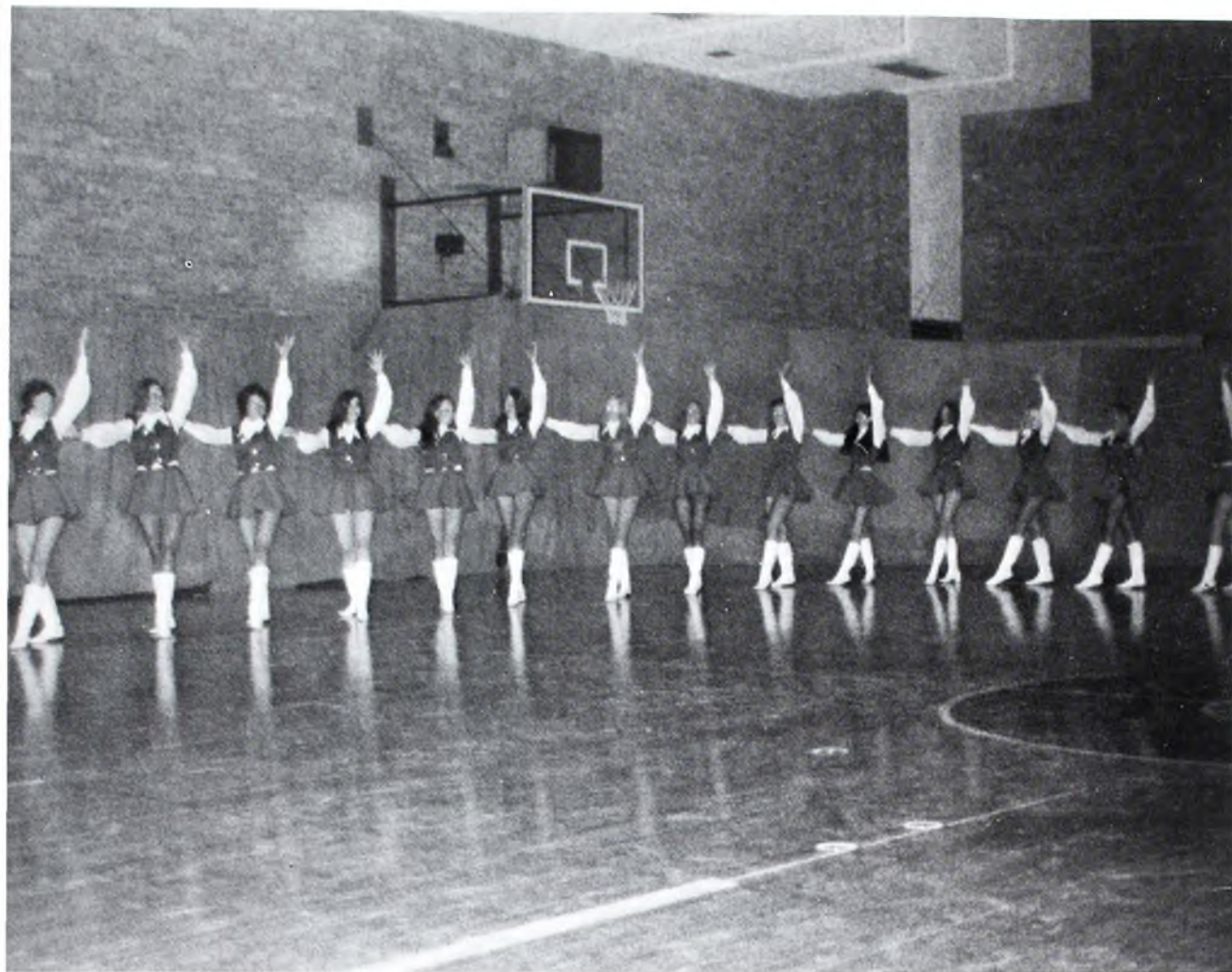

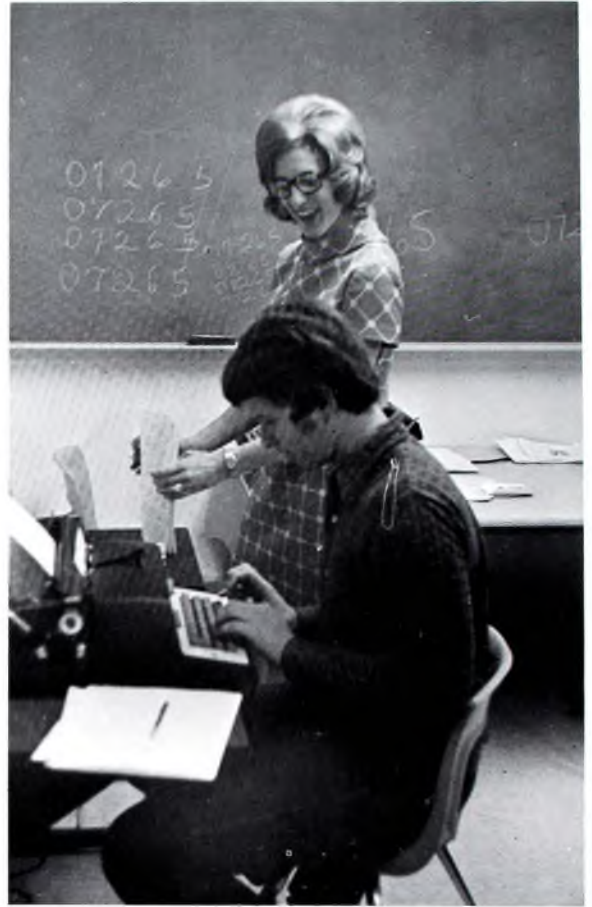

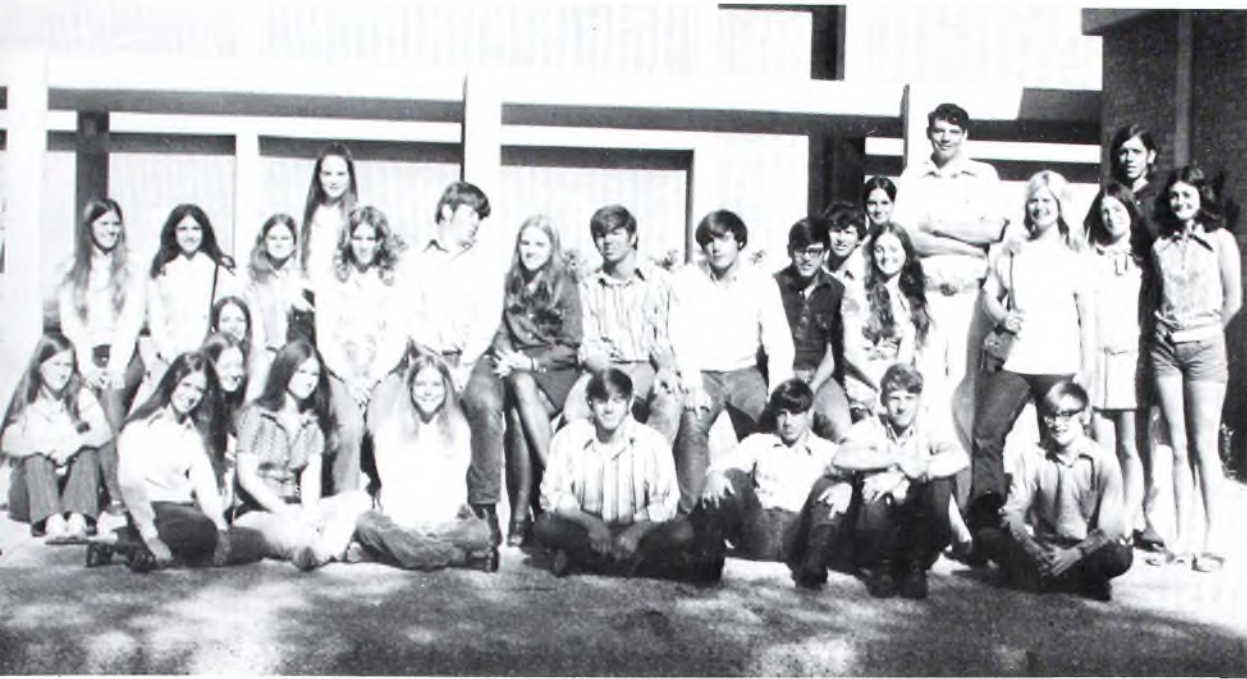

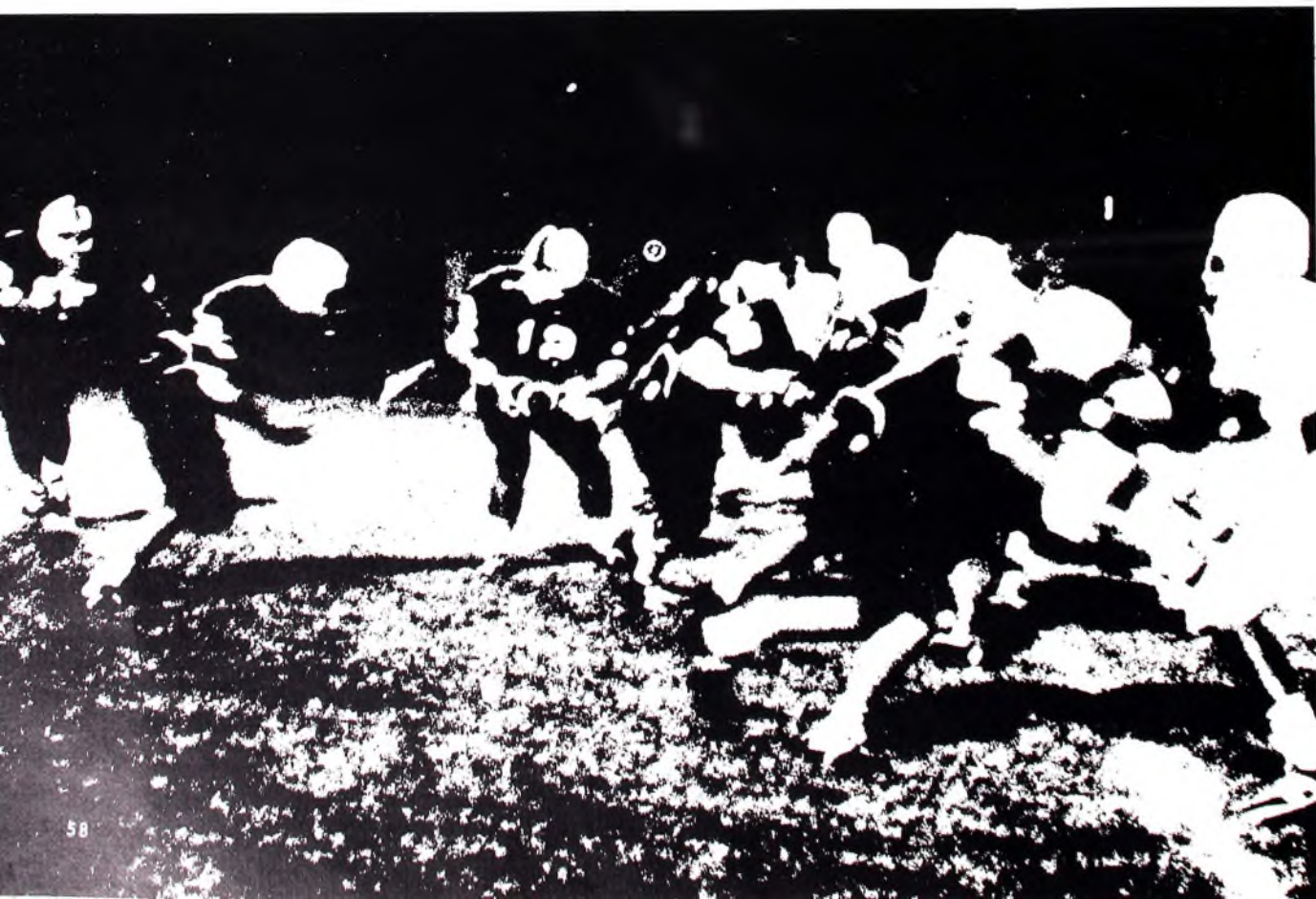
The Rocketry Club (left) got off to a flying start this year. Several enthusiasts came together with the goal in mind of building and flying rockets.

On a rainsoaked field, the Westlake Chaparrals opened a tremendous season with a 20-0 shutout of S. A. Cole. The Chaps then started to display a well-tuned offensive machine combined with a rugged defense and demolished Llano, Marble Falls, Burnet, and Hays Cons. to end an undefeated non-district schedule.

The battle then began for the coveted district 20 AA crown. The Chaps completed their third straight shutout by rolling over Cameron. The powerful Road-runners, now ranked tenth in the state by the Dallas Morning News poll, engulfed the Round Rock Dragons 34-6. Arch-rival Georgetown set the scene for the Chaps' unprecedented third Cen-Tex Game of the Week. 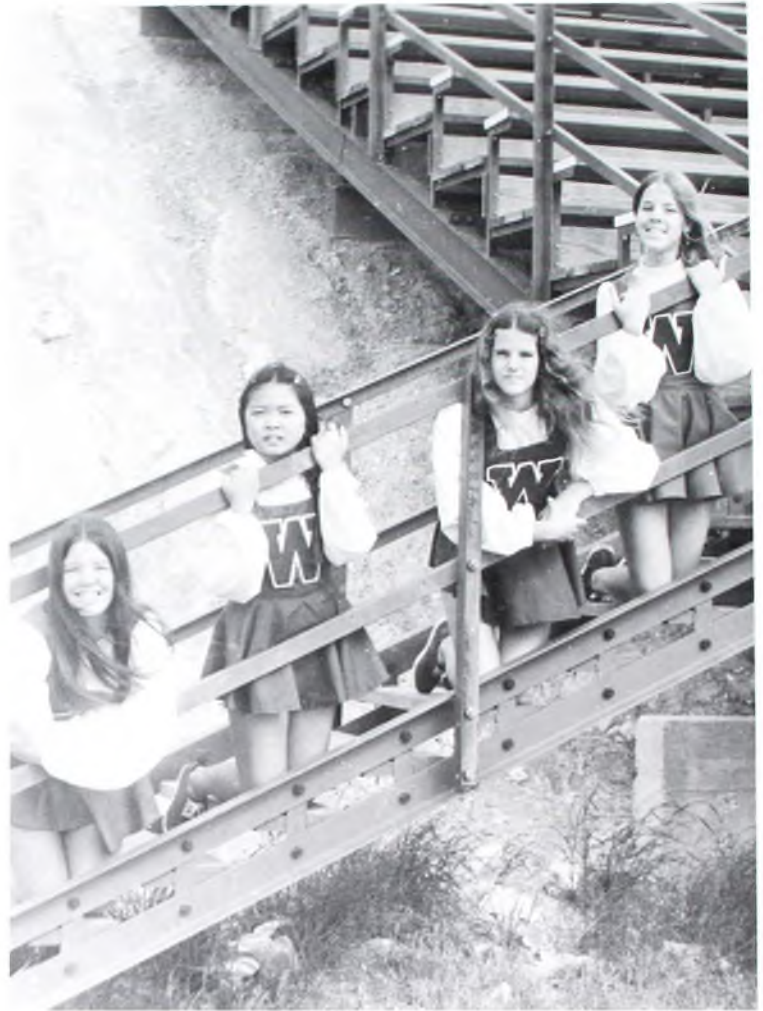
# CHEERLEADERS BOOST CHAPS SPIRIT

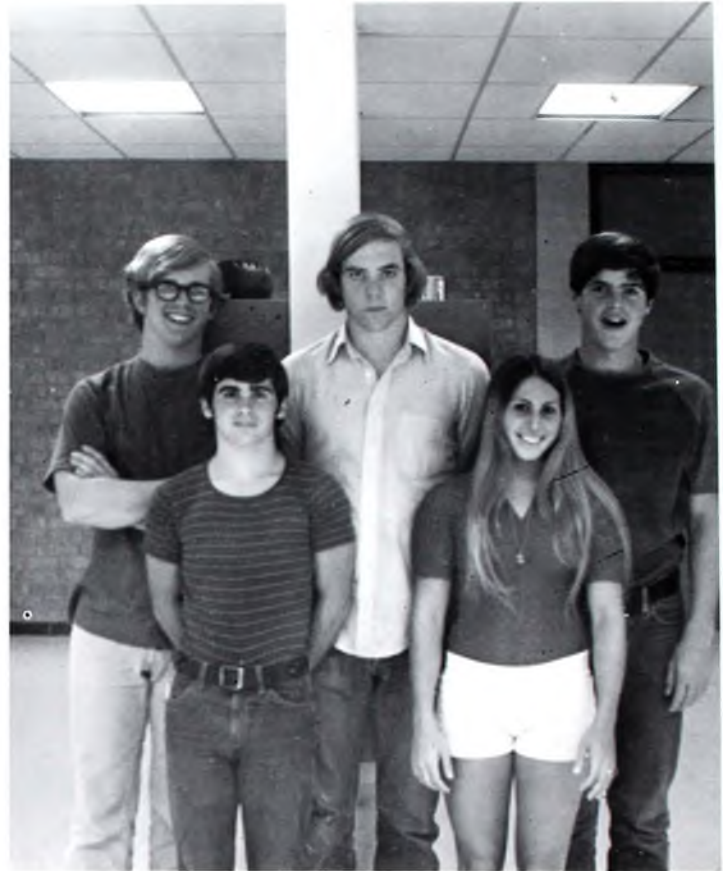
# CHAP SWIMMERS SPLASH

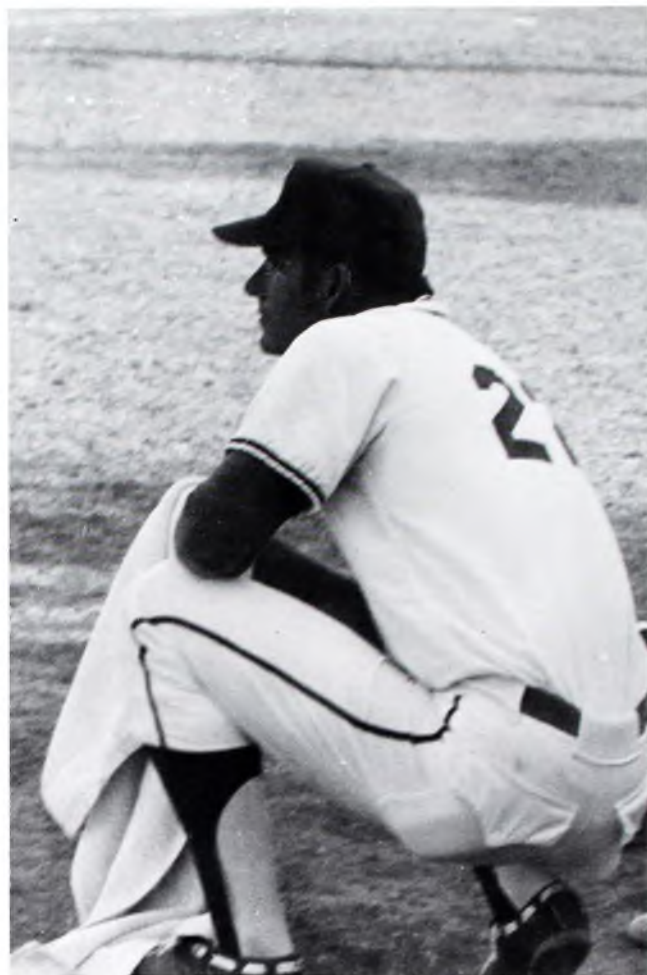

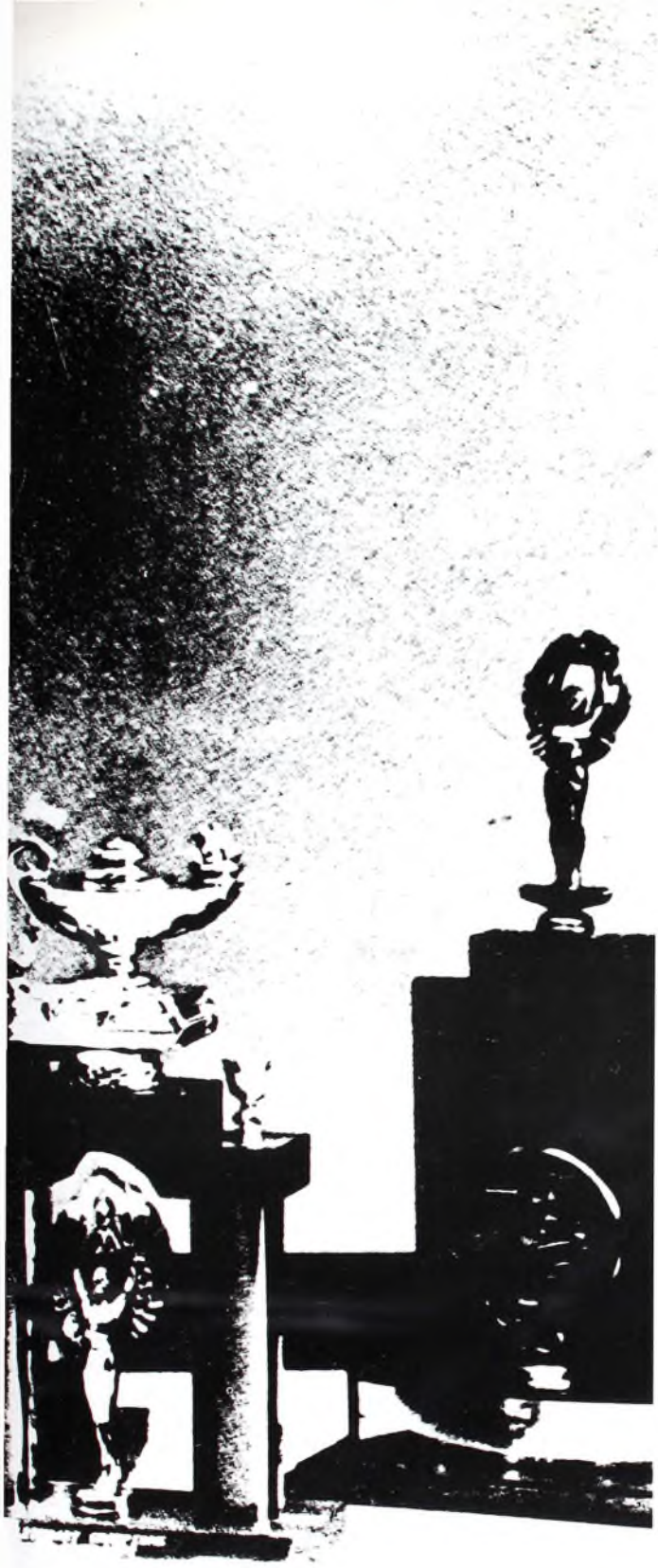

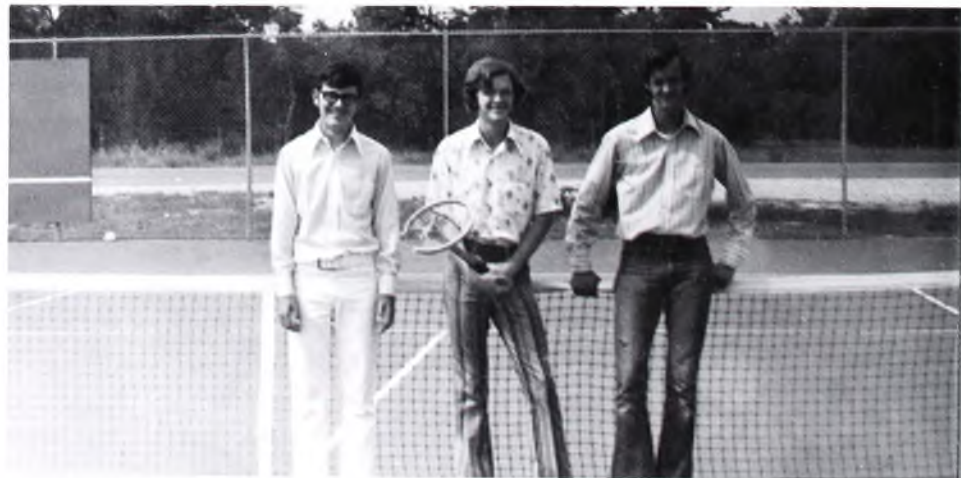
The basketball and tennis teams won first in district competition. Three basketball players became members of District basketball teams, and three tennis team members went on to regional competition.

# STUDENT REPRESENTATIVES CHOSEN



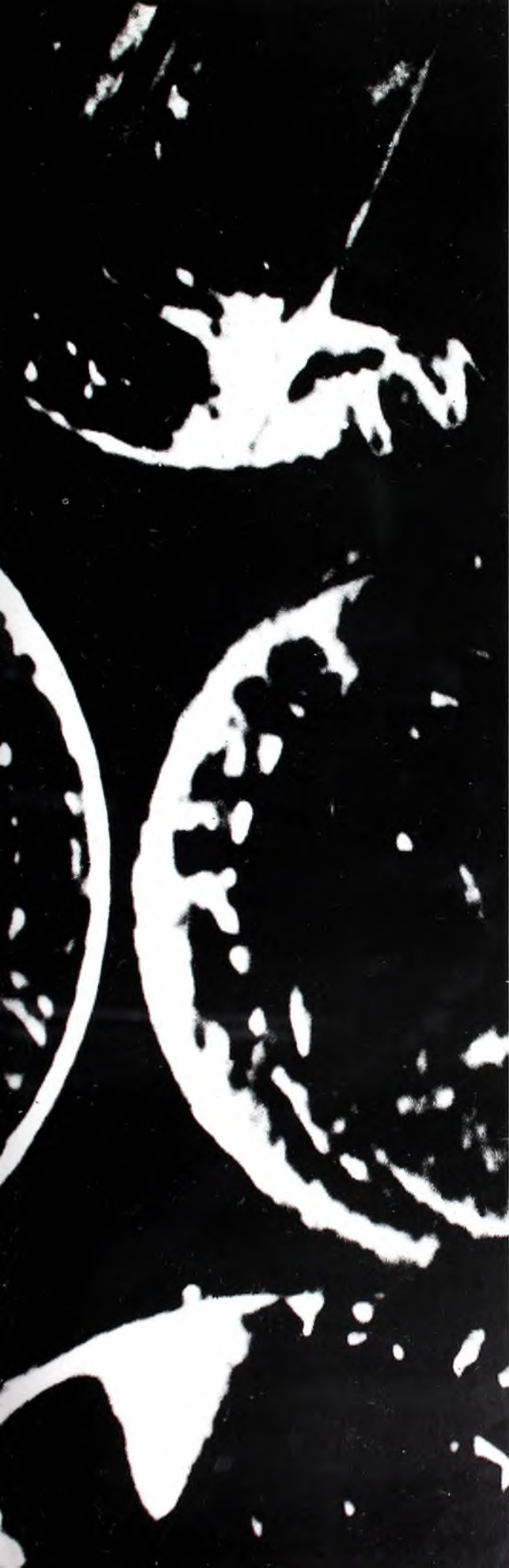
